2.5. Course content (syllabus)	Political philosophy is a branch of philosophy that deals with issues related to human life in the social and political community. Unlike political science or sociology, which approaches these questions from an empirical point of view (trying to determine how society works), the approach of political philosophy is based on a theoretical-normative point of view (the answer to the question of how society <i>should</i> function is sought!). In this sense, political philosophy is close to ethics. The course presents the most important representatives in the history of European political philosophy, from Plato, Aristotle, Augustine, Thomas Aquinas, through Thomas
