#### INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

*Disputatio philosophica* is an international scientific journal at The Faculty of Philosophy and Religious Studies, University of Zagreb, which annually publishes articles in philosophy, religious studies and theology in English, German, Italian, Spanish and French language.

## Submission requirements:

Authors must affirm that their submission:

- has not been published elsewhere, either in whole or in part, in any language (Prior presentation of a work at a conference is acceptable. Period publication in conference proceedings may be acceptable, depending on the format and distribution of the proceedings. Please discuss prior publication in conference proceedings with the editor.);
- is not under review by another publication
- > will not be submitted for review elsewhere while under review at *Disputatio philosophica*
- is not based on data reported in any other prior or pending publication, unless the author provides the editor with supporting documentation to demonstrate the unique contribution of the submission; and
- has no conflict of interest pertinent to the subject of the article.

Works previously submitted and rejected are not acceptable unless the rejection letter specifically indicated that the editorial team would consider another improved version of manuscripton the same topic from the author.

### *Versions of the article:*

➤ Preprint – Articles may not be posted online during the review process. *Disputatio philosophica* tries to ensure a fair and unbiased peer review process, so it is important that the manuscript is not available online, especially accompanied by the author's personal information.

- ➤ Postprint *Disputatio philosophica* currently does not allow authors to publish postprints of their work.
- ➤ Version of Record Authors may deposit the publisher's version to their websites, their institutional repository or any other repository of their choice. It is also important that the deposited version is the actual version of record in PDF format that contains bibliographical information about the article and the journal.

# Submission fee:

Disputatio philosophica does not does not charge any fee for submission or for the peer review and publishing process.

### *Formatting and style requirements:*

Manuscripts that do not meet formatting, style, and anonymity requirements will be returned to authors. This may delay the review process:

# Manuscripts:

- o **Pdf and doc** format
- Double-spaced
- o 12-point Times New Roman type
- o Not to exceed 12,000 words
- o Page numbers on all pages
- o **First page** of the manuscript should include

**Full name** of the author

If the article has **two authors**, the authors should **explain their contribution** to the article.

**Email** or address for correspondence

Name of **affiliated institution**, in original language and in English language

Title in original language and in English language

**Abstract** in original language and in English language (no more than 150 words)

**Key words** in original language and in English language (up to 10 words alphabetically ordered)

o **Tables and charts** must be submitted as part of the manuscript and not as separate documents. (Prior to publication, the author may be asked to provide original source files for any charts or graphs in the manuscript.)

If authors do not write in their mother tongue, we kindly ask them to have **the paper proofread before sending** it to *Disputatio philosophica*.

### > Anonymity

- The manuscript itself must not contain the author's name, institution or other identifying information, on all other pages other than the information noted above on the first page.
- > All **use of published or unpublished work** written by persons other than the author must receive proper citation.
- > Style
  - Manuscripts should follow the guidelines of the most recent Chicago Manual of Style (<a href="http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools\_citationguide.html">http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org/tools\_citationguide.html</a>). Authors are welcome to follow either 1) author-date or 2) notes and bibliography system. Choosing between the two depends on subject matter and the nature of sources cited. Editorial Office suggests using the author-date system.
  - Here is illustrated the **author-date system**, for the main common types of publication (T= In-text citation, R= Reference list entry):
  - Book

  - Chapter or other part of a book
    - T: (Fumerton 2006, 85-87)
    - R: Fumerton, Richard. 2006. "The Epistemic Role of Testimony: Internalist and Externalist Perspectives." In *The Epistemology of Testimony*, edited by Jennifer Lackey and Ernest Sosa, 77-92. Oxford: Oxford University Press.

#### • Edited collections

T: (Lackey and Sosa 2006, 85-87)

R: Lackey, Jennifer, and Ernest Sosa, eds. 2006. *The Epistemology of Testimony*. Oxford: Oxford University Press.

#### • E-book

T: (Russell 1917, 37)

R: Russell, Bertrand. 1917. *Mysticism and Logic and Other Essays*. London: George Allen & Unwin Ltd. Project Gutenberg.

#### • Journal article

For all types of publications guideline above should be followed with exception of placing 'forthcoming' instead of date of publication. For example, in case of a book:

R: Recanati, François. forthcoming. *Mental Files*. Oxford: Oxford University Press.

- T: (Gödel 1951)

R: Gödel, Kurt. 1951. *Some basic theorems on the foundations of mathematics and theirphilosophical implications*. Unpublished manuscript, last modified August 3, 1951.
